Thrive is a specific way of working with children and young people that supports healthy social and emotional development. Confident, curious, creative and capable children and young people are more open to learning and better equipped to deal with life's ups and downs. The Thrive Approach has consistently shown a positive impact on resilience and wellbeing that can, in turn, lead to improved achievement.

Evolving over the last 25 plus years, the architects of Thrive drew from observation, experience and extensive research into child development. They identified the underlying social and emotional needs being signalled by children and young people's differing and sometimes troubling behaviour. More recently Thrive has been informed by established neuroscience, which reaffirms the Approach for both right-time and reparative developments.

Thrive-Online[™], the assessment, action-planning and progress monitoring tool, underpins the Thrive Approach, ensuring all your staff are able to provide targeted support for every child and young person.



Thrive-Online is a unique system for screening, action-planning and monitoring

Thrive-Online enables your staff to clearly and systematically identify the social and emotional development needs of children and young people in your setting.

Through an intuitive and easy-to-use interface, Thrive-Online will help your staff to:

- Identify social and emotional development needs by screening individual children
 and groups
- Select suitable activities for groups of children that fit with your curriculum plans and support age appropriate development
- Create action plans for individual children to help them make up for any gaps or interruptions in their social and emotional learning
- Chart the progress of both individuals and groups over time.

The system can be used to report progress at child, group, whole-school and multi-school level. These reports can also be used in conjunction with typical school attainment measures to evidence the difference Thrive is making within your setting.

Funding Ways to help you fund Thrive

Funding is often available to support the adoption of Thrive throughout your school or MAT

The Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) is additional funding to support disadvantaged students, and those with parents in the regular armed forces, of all abilities perform better. It is for closing the gap between them and their peers.

The PPG for just four pupils will fund training and online resources to support all other PPG pupils in your school for a year.* Just one PPG each subsequent year will then maintain in-house capacity to support these children across the school.

Future in Mind

Clinical commissioning groups and local authorities can access Future in Mind funding to pay for improvements to children and young people's mental health. There are regional and local funds also available through charitable trusts, local authorities and clinical commissioning groups.
